Can anyone top that? Bill worked for Glendale Federal Savings while Betty spent 25 years at the Jet Propulsion Lab as administrative assistant to the Assistant Lab Director. Betty, and her boss all retired on the same day in 1986. After Bill passed away, another couple with whom they were long-time friends also suffered a loss. In time, Betty and the widower, Jim, became domestic partners. They traveled all over the world for 12 years until Jim passed away last year. Betty still golfs. She also served for a while on the Rec Board, as did Bill. She has two daughters. One lives in Washington State. The other, with her husband, is buying a home on Avenue of the Oaks. What better place for her conservation project to be on display! She got permission from our Rec Board and help from her family and some local businesses. She also earned money from her own cookie sales and then planned the whole thing. The result is now in the area between our swimming pool and the dressing rooms, under a trio of white birches. Cleaning up – In light of Coronavirus concerns, the Rec Board has ordered our janitorial service to ramp-up its cleaning operation. Special attention is to be given to the gym.
