Decals, Gate Cards, and Carports – As of now, only cars with FV decals can come through the Residents’ Gate and/or park in a carport. If a resident is driving a borrowed, or rented, or just-bought car, he/she must enter FV through the Visitors’ Gate. The CC just approved a new mirror-hanger, a light-blue card similar to the yellow visitor’s parking permit. It is a temporary way to give a car without a decal the same privileges as one with a decal. The card is not available yet. Watch for a notice in the *Villager*. Additionally, your gate card may only be used when you are in the car with it. Violations of these rules are expensive.

Annual Meetings – The CC advised all of the associations’ reps to start thinking about how and where they will hold their Annual Meetings and elections amid the COVID restrictions.

Next Year’s Insurance – The Insurance Committee has asked four brokers to prepare bids. The committee will hear their proposals and select two. Then the Community Council will make the final choice. It has been a long time since we solicited competitive bids.
